About the PROBUS Organization

PROBUS is an association of retired persons who join together in autonomous clubs throughout the world.

The basic purpose of a PROBUS Club is to provide regular gatherings for those who, in retirement, appreciate and value opportunities to meet others in similar circumstances and of similar levels of interest. Clubs may be established as men or women only or mixed.

There is no compulsion to attend any number of meetings. Participation in various activities is encouraged to get the most value for your membership.

An update - Members may recall that about this time last year we ran an informal survey on member's attitude to PSPL. The main outcome was that the amount of the capitalised fee for service was questioned. The Club's management adopted this matter by writing to PSPL requesting details of its compilation. We received a three page letter in response but it lacked any of the detail that we had requested. So, we wrote directly to the PSPL Chairman, Mr David Simpson, repeating our request. At the time of writing (26 January 2021) no response has been received to that letter.

PSPL has the nominal power of accreditation of Probus Clubs and the use of the Probus trademark. It is evident that PSPL takes the view that Probus clubs are effectively required to support its solvency despite the fact that there is no contractual or other legal obligation to do so. Clubs are required to pay a reasonable fee for service.

At this time PSPL's service has been reduced largely to providing annual insurance cover, a reduced digital Active Retirees magazine and emails as deemed necessary.

We need to decide how to go forward.

The role of the Liaison Committee

An(other) entity with autocratic tendencies



Did you know that it took more than two hours to do it, but a group of volunteers managed to avoid having their faces caught by one of the 89 spy cameras on

a 1.1 km stretch of road in Beijing? Moving slowly and carefully along the pavement, some crouched, others tilted their heads towards the ground, as curious onlookers snapped photos. By 2018, there were already about 200 million surveillance cameras in China. And by 2021 this number is expected to reach 560 million, according to the Wall Street Journal, roughly one for every 2.4 citizens.

...and something else to be wary of

Did you know that more than 8,500 Australians are hospitalised and about 550 die annually from causes linked to cat dependent diseases each year?

Toxoplasmosis (T. gondii), cat roundworm and cat scratch disease are caused by pathogens that depend on cats and the economic cost of these pathogens in Australia is more than \$6 billion per year. The T. gondii parasite (from cat poo) stays with us for life, encased in a cyst, often in the brain effecting routine mental functions. There is no cure. Roundworm infections cause mild symptoms, but can cause tissue damage, which can be serious if it occurs in a place like the eye or heart.



Cat scratch disease is a bacterial infection with typical symptoms of sores, fevers, aches

and swollen glands. But more serious symptoms, such as inflammation of heart tissue, cysts in the organs and loss of vision can also occur. So, cat owners should take care. Wash your hands when handling them, avoid scratches and contact with cat litter (when gardening too) and isolate your cat when outdoors. Do not feed them raw meat as that can be a source of T. gondii.

The final monthly medal went to Dennis Price. Through the year Barry Laing and David Shield won 3 each with Covid 19 awarded two titles. Most balls won in 6 months returned to David S with 27 from Barry on 24 and John Porter and Dennis Price on 20 apiece.

The ironman award was a 3 way tie but as current titleholder was retained by Ron Hills (photo). This makes it his 4th time in a row and was only beaten in a dodgy countback on the other occasions. It was determined to make this highly esteemed trophy a permanent fixture in the Hills household.

The 2020 eclectic trophy was decided in the last round. David Bourke narrowly lost the title last year to Barry by 0.1 of a shot and led into the final round. David S managed a birdie on hole 14 to move 0.1 shots ahead only to have Dennis Price also make up a shot on the same hole to go 0.1 in front of David S. Mr Bourke was relegated to third spot by 0.2 and 0.1 shots.

The final trophy is the best average points score for the year with 3 players averaging over 30 points. Barry Laing was third with 30.58 behind Dennis Price who had a strong finish to the year to average 31.4. Have you ever heard of pardalotes? Very few have, yet these thumb-sized birds are quintessentially Australian. Their diet is unusual, comprising mostly the sweet manna that seeps from eucalypt foliage, and "lerp", the

sugary coating of psyllid insects (a specialised group of bugs). They track these resources with the seasons but of the four species, one is now endagered through loss of habitat.

RNA Vaccines

Vaccination is one of the major success stories of modern medicine, greatly reducing the incidence of infectious diseases such as measles, and eradicating others, such as smallpox. Conventional vaccine approaches have not been as effective against rapidly evolving pathogens like influenza or emerging disease threats such as the Ebola or Zika viruses. RNA based vaccines could have an impact in these areas due to their shorter manufacturing times and greater effectiveness. Beyond infectious diseases, RNA vaccines have potential as novel therapeutic options for major diseases such as cancer.

Summary

- Unlike a normal vaccine, RNA vaccines work by introducing an mRNA sequence (the molecule which tells cells what to build) which is coded for a disease specific antigen, once produced within the body, the antigen is recognised by the immune system, preparing it to fight the real thing
- RNA vaccines are faster and cheaper to produce than traditional vaccines, and a RNA based vaccine is also safer for the patient, as they are not produced using infectious elements
- Production of RNA vaccines is laboratory based, and the process could be standardised and scaled, allowing quick responses to large outbreaks and epidemics
- Most current research is into RNA vaccines for infectious diseases and cancer, for which there are several early-stage clinical trials, there is also some early research into the potential of RNA vaccines for allergies
- There is still a lot of work to be done before mRNA vaccines can become standard treatments, in the meantime, we need a better understanding of their potential side effects, and more evidence of their long term efficacy.

Fulgurite and Faraday - fast facts about lightning

What is Fulgurite you ask. Well, if you were on a beach and lightning struck the sand and not yourself you might see some created. When lightning hits the ground and particularly beaches, the mineral sands are fused and vitrified. The resulting product varies widely depending on types and volume of mineral sands.

Faraday on the other hand keeps you safe in your car from lightning. You are not protected by your rubber tyres but by being enclosed in a metal cage acting as a rudimentary Faraday cage.
