


## **Newsletter May 2021**





In South Africa a Department of Tourism clean-up crew recently found over 200 dead crows off and along N2 near Cape Town and there was concern that they may have died from some sort of Avian Flu.

A Pathologist examined the remains of all the crows, and, to everyone's relief, confirmed the problem was NOT Avian related. The cause of death in fact appeared to be from vehicular impacts. However, during analysis it was noted that varying colours of paint appeared on the bird's beaks and claws. By analysing these paint residues it was found that 98% of the crows had been killed by impact with motorbikes, while only 2% were killed by cars. The Department of Safety then hired an Ornithological Behaviourist to determine if there was a cause for the disproportionate percentages of motorbike kills versus car kills.

The Ornithological Behaviourist quickly concluded that when crows eat road kill, they always have a look-out crow to warn of danger. They discovered that while all the lookout crows could shout "Cah", not a single one could shout "bike."



Back in 2013, about <u>three million</u> migrating short-tailed shearwater birds died along the east coast of Australia. This was a tragic event, and it's only now that scientists have established what caused it. Researchers found the

seabirds had been <u>eating a lot of non-food materials</u>, including floating pumice stone from an underwater volcanic eruption, and plastics. They starved because they couldn't access enough prey to complete their journey along their 8,000 km path. Seabirds are widely considered to be indicators of the health of a marine ecosystem.

**How we really won the war - or British Bread Pudding.** Or, Doesn't everybody have recipes from Granny or Auntie Mable? So, here is the recipe for Bread Pudding from my mother, Elsie Massey. I have her original handwritten copy but fear you would not be able to read it, let alone cook it.

#### **Bread Pudding**

#### Ingredients

Bread - old or new, white or brown - half in quantity of required size of finished pudding.

Mixed fruit, cut peel, glace cherries, sultanas currents, raisins. Any of these that you have in any mixture. Quantity same as bread.

Plain flour about half a cup.

Suet - 4oz for any size pudding.

Mixed spice - one tablespoon.

Sugar - one tablespoon.

#### Method

Put the bread in a big mixing bowl and cover with water. Let it soak for 15 minutes. Squeeze out the excess water. Mix is dead soggy.

Add all the other ingredients and mix thoroughly - then mix it some more.

Leave the mixture to stand for at least half an hour. The fruit is soaking up some of the moisture,

Grease a baking tin with margarine. Drop the mixture in and spread evenly. Sprinkle with sugar if desired.

Put it in a medium oven for about an non-then hotter for 15 minutes to brown. If it tends to burn on top cover with foil. Jooking is very forgiving. Trial and error is needed. It will always be edible.
